a hop from Clapham Junction, has a long queue of families from SW postcodes who want in. 'Many of our students go on to art college or drama school or music college or to study sport... That's why they come to us. So the academic side of things is not all that we do here,' he says. The just-finished Fiennes Theatre has the thespians all abuzz (there is strong

dramatic tradition) and the choir. who have toured Finland, sang so well at St Paul's that the Dean has invited them back. Travel is a big deal, with trips all over the Continent and to partner schools in India. There's a super-impressive sixth-form centre and a great boat club at Barnes Bridge - rowing is booming with crews boasting several wins and a silver at the National Schools Regatta for the boys' first IV last year.
