VISIONS & AIMS







1. **Every** FHS student to be involved in Outreach in **every** year of their time at FHS.

2. FHS students to leave school with a clear idea of the vital role charities and volunteer networks play in sustaining our society, and their responsibility to play their part during their adult lives.

3. To engage all members of our community in a **culture of giving** by sharing their time, talent and treasure.

4. All partnerships with charitable organisations and state schools are focussed on **sustainable and impactful activities** that make use of the **expertise**, **experience**, **and capacity** of our school community.

OUR PARTNERSHIPS

Francis Holland School, Sloane Square, has worked with more than 55 charitable organisations and state schools over the past 10 years. FHS has long-term, sustainable, and impactful partnerships with seven charitable organisations and schools. We also respond to urgent needs and crises, identified by the student body, with one-off fundraising campaigns.



Katherine Low Settlement (KLS)

KLS Community Centre in Battersea works to provide social opportunities for local elders and vulnerable people (including newly arrived unaccompanied young people and refugees), as well as learning mentors. Francis Holland has partnered with KLS for 100 years.







A 100 Year Friendship...

The enduring nature of the relationship between Francis Holland School and the charity created by its former pupil, Katherine Low, must be unique, or at least very rare. We are so fortunate that our founder clearly had such a strong connection to her old school that the staff were involved with setting up a charity in her memory. The legacy has been felt by thousands of people in Battersea over the past century.

This year, we are particularly grateful to the Francis Holland community for their generosity at the Spring Fair. The funds raised will be used to provide our year-round academic support programme for 350+ children from refugee backgrounds. The programme includes individual mentoring, homework and activity clubs and casework to help them navigate and thrive in the UK education system, just as Francis Holland students do.

As always, we are delighted that our partnership goes beyond the financial. The elderly people we support are so pleased when Francis Holland students visit us to sing Carols, participate in intergenerational poetry classes, distribute gifts and support our lunch clubs. I hope that our friendship can continue for another century and beyond, and that Katherine Low's example inspires current Francis Holland students to think about the legacies they themselves would like to create.

In-Deep Community Task Force

In-Deep started as a befriending charity, supporting the elderly in Westminster and Lambeth with lunch clubs and social activities. In recent years they have expanded to working with young people with profound learning needs and other disabilities.



The 23 year partnership we have had with Francis Holland School has been invaluable in enabling us to grow and to keep our activities going as we are mainly volunteer led. Both parents and students have been a light to older peoples' and children with disabilities' lives, particularly through the pandemic. The funds raised by the school have enabled dinners and other social activities to happen for older people, as well as arts based workshops and music therapy for children with special educational needs and disabilities. It has been a privilege seeing students volunteer with us and see their skills develop as they grow. FHS has helped us make a profound impact on the community.

Hammersmith and Fulham Foodbank

The biggest Foodbank in London, and possibly Europe, which supports over 27,000 people with food parcels in the local area, 30% of which are children. FHS collects for the foodbank each month and has provided 4% of their total donations in 2023-24 – we are their biggest non-supermarket donator of food.



The support that Francis Holland School have provided to Hammersmith and Fulham Foodbank has been inspirational. They have taken this partnership to a new level, passing the passion for supporting foodbanks from one year group to the next to create a long term legacy. CASE STUDY 01

PAXTON PRIMARY SCHOOL

Building a library for today (and tomorrow).

In 2023, our School Library team worked with Paxton Primary School to set up, stock, staff, support, and sustain a new library. This was in response to Paxton's 2022 OFSTED inspection, in which a pressing need was identified to improve students reading fluency and confidence.

Our vision is for Paxton to have a self-managed and sustainable library space for use in years to come, reducing the direct support from FHS in the academic year 2024-25, and providing support for Paxton to become a hub for library development within the Gypsy Hill Federation.

SET UP

A cumulative 37 staff days of setting up and transforming disused space into welcoming and wellstocked school library over Summer 2023.

FHS Parents made a considerable donation to Paxton to support their refugee and newly arrived community, providing shoes, coats, toys, uniform, home clothes, nightwear and iPads with language translation software.



139 children from St Barnabas Primary School attended book week talks at FHS and received a book, subsidised by publishers, coordinated by FHS.



300+ books provided at Christmas to Westminster Library Services for Looked After Children in the borough of Westminster, funded by FHS library.

CASE STUDY 02

HAMMERSMITH & FULHAM FOODBANK

Whole community participation, huge impact.



Despite the growing need for Foodbanks, we remain committed to finding a future without the need for mass emergency food. As well as addressing hunger in the local community our drive is to find the root cause of the problems faced by every Foodbank user and try and fix them so that they do not need to rely on us. We currently have an amazingly loyal donation base in the community but our increase in demand means every month we have a food shortfall of over 6 tonnes which we have to purchase through financial donations or emergency grants. We want to close that gap and every donation helps us to create a sustainable future for Foodbank whilst working to influence earlier intervention and crisis prevention.

Francis Holland School has partnered with The Hammersmith and Fulham Foodbank to address the growing need for emergency support in West London. As well as providing emergency food parcels to those in dire need, the Hammersmith and Fulham Foodbank directs foodbank users to the support they are entitled to, or otherwise cannot access, in order to empower people to find sustainable solutions to the issues that are driving them to the point of acute crisis.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Francis Holland School, Sloane Square, offers significant financial support to the wider community, both in terms of means-tested bursary provision and by way of leveraging the talents of our pupils and parents to engage in charitable fundraising throughout the year.

In 2023-24, **28** FHS students were in receipt of means-tested bursaries, of which **14** (50%) received transformational bursaries (100% full fee support)

THE PROMISE CAMPAIGN

Seeks to build a £15m endowment to support 50 students on full fees in perpetuity. In 2023, the Promise Campaign Fund stands at £1.2m, donated by parents and alumni.
