he 870 pupils from Christ's Hospital, formerly located in the City of London (1552-1902), celebrate St Matthew's Day each year with a ceremony in the City of London. This is a tradition which gives the school, now located in 1,200 acres of Sussex countryside near Horsham, the opportunity loreturn to its roots. This year, to celebrate the 460th anniversary of Christ's Hospital on 21 September, the entire school will march to St Paul's for a service followed by a visit to Guildhall. Here each pupil receives largesse, a monetary gift, fresh



from the Mint, the amount according to his or her standing in the school. John Franklin, Head Master of Christ's Hospital, said: "St Matthew's Day is an important tradition when we thank the City and school's Governors for their generosity."

All talk

erfecting the art of public speaking is certainly a skill that would come in useful if one wishes to run for prime minister. No wonder, then, that Eton, the current holder of The English-Speaking Union's Schools Mace debating competition (the oldest national competition in the UK, run since 1957) has produced no less than 19 prime ministers of Great Britain.

Other schools with oration in the blood include Westminster, which has produced seven prime ministers, and Harrow, which has educated four.
