Teacher dies in open-air pool

Pupils and staff from a Belgravia school have paid tribute to their "lovely" and "kind" music teacher, who died tragically of a heart attack, aged just 27.

Richard Turner, who taught the trumpet at Francis Holland girls' school on Bourne Street, collapsed as he was swimming in the open-air pool at Brockwell Lido, Herne Hill, in August.



Lifeguards desperately tried to save him and were joined within minutes by three ambulance crews, but he later died at a south London hospital.

Miss Stephanie Pattenden, headmistress of Francis Holland school, said: "This is very sad and shocking news. Richard will be remembered as a kind and generous colleague, a very valuable member of the music department, and a talented and enthusiastic teacher and musician."

Mr Turner was a successful jazz trumpeter and composer who played with the Mercury Prizenominated band Friendly Fires. The teacher, who lived in Camberwell and was described as being in peak physical condition before he died, had just released an album with his own band, Round Trip.

Friendly Fires said in a statement: "Rich played trumpet in our live gigs on and off for three years. He was an exceptional musician and his contributions to our shows will be hugely missed."

A Francis Holland pupil wrote on Londonjazz.blogspot.com: "Richard taught trumpet at our school for a year. He was a really lovely, kind, interesting and immensely talented man. His pupils will be devastated, as indeed will the rest of the school."
